

LIMIT BIDS & FORCING BIDS

This terms course is designed to recap on basic bidding and to suggest some more precise methods for *intermediate players with regular partners*. Although limit bids do not necessarily close the auction, they warn partner that any further action should only be taken if they have extra strength that has not yet been shown.

Strong bids are often limit bids, 'Invitational bids' are actually limit bids. and, weak hands are initially often forcing.

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I CANNOT AFFORD TO BID ANY HIGHER 1.

There are three types of LIMIT BID that tell partner that you have bid as high as you can afford:

1. When you **return partner to their suit** - you do so AT THE LEVEL YOU CAN AFFORD
2. When you **rebid your own suit** - you do so AT THE LEVEL YOU CAN AFFORD
3. When you bid No Trumps*



In the examples shown below **green shows FORCING bids**, **red shows LIMIT bids**.

*All the **red** bids shown above are advising partner that you have reached the limit of what you can afford.

BUT if you are in a GAME FORCING SITUATION e.g. 1♥ - 2♣

2NT - 3♥ shows three hearts *on the way to game!*

Of course making a LIMIT BID does not necessarily close the auction - but it is a warning that IF partner bids on, s/he does so because of extra strength that s/he hasn't yet had a chance to show.

East's response of 1NT denies four spades and limits the hand to a maximum 9 HCPs. Many would rebid 2♥ but 2♣ would show where 9 of your 13 cards are. Let east decide!

North's rebid shows 5/4 in hearts and diamonds, AND the rebid is below the barrier. This limits the strength of the hand to 11 pts up to a maximum of 16.

North has offered two suits. South has a minimum hand and needs to stop the auction. S/he does this by returning partner to the preferred suit at the level that south can afford.

NOTICE this does not show a FIT. It is simply the better of the two suits offered. North must not get excited thinking that there is a fit.

It is a FULL STOP!!!

A similar hand, but this time south has TWO MORE of north's 2nd suit than the first suit. After north's limit bid of 2♦, south recognises that a game contract cannot be reached. Therefore south gives suit preference to the 2nd suit BY PASSING!!



IF north had held 17+ pts. the rebid would have been higher than the barrier of 2♥! i.e. the rebid would have been 3♦

North's hand hasn't changed and south is STILL sitting with a weak hand. This time however south has a SIX card suit and is therefore entitled to reject both of partner's suits and give preference to his own suit, spades.

NOTE that this is also a LIMIT BID which north should respect. It will close the auction.

North opens the bidding with a five card minor suit.

The hand could be many shapes and any strength from 11 up to 19 pts. It might be 5/4 with a major, it might be 6/5 in clubs and diamonds, it could be a balanced 15+ hand.

South has minimum responding values and a fit with partner's minor. (Where are the majors you might ask?)

South could show weakness and a fit by responding 2♣ but that is unlikely to stop west from showing one (or both majors) Before west gets a chance to show what he has, a responding bid of 3♣ from south might make it difficult. How does north know that south is weak? 3♣ normally shows 10-12 points! Well, like all bidding you must agree this with partner before you start playing!!!!

Hand 2. illustrates another reason why this convention is worthy of consideration.

This time south has a much better hand and would normally respond 3♣ (10/12 pts.) This would unfortunately take up a lot of bidding space, making it hard to explore a NT contract.

North *knows that 2♣ shows about 10 pts and bids 2♠ to tell partner that this suit is OK for NTs. South can now show north a good stop in hearts and this makes it easy for north to bid 3NT.

While on the subject of LIMIT raises in minor suits, here is a very specialised responding bid in clubs. This ONLY applies to CLUB opening and responses! After a 1♣ opening, and responder does not have a four card suit to bid - other than clubs!

Responder bids 1NT to show PRECISELY 9 HCPs.

If you decide to play INVERTED MINOR RAISES With 6-8 pts. respond 3♣. With 10ish pts. respond 2♣

If you don't play INVERTED MINOR RAISES With 6-8 pts. respond 2♣. With 10ish pts. respond 3♣

With 9/10 pts., no obvious fit, but a SPADE STOP, bid 1NT at your 1st turn. On this auction, west has 6 hearts and close to a 5 loser. If west had game values and five-hearts, west can cue bid 2♠ to find whether east has three hearts.

The main tip here is that after intervention, your 1NT, should be stronger. Not 6-9 - but around about 9/10

At equal vulnerability and assuming that your partner knows "1 - 2 that'll do," east could show support AND weakness on each of these hands.

After a single raise west should NOT bid freely again unless he is a 5 loser or has 17 ish points.

IF, after west's pass, north were to bid 2♠, east must leave any further action to west who is in 'protective position'. If west then bid 3♥, it is merely competitive. NOT an invitation to bid 4♥.

After a X by opponents east could 'stretch' a little, again to make it harder for opponents to get into the auction. This raise, *after the double*, must not be seen as an invitation to bid on.

It is merely competitive.

In grey is the same hand as shown previously as a *2♥ response. The reason that you might bid 3♥ on this auction is that the 5 card spade suit has not been shown. Make it hard for them.

Before sacrificing in 4♥ east's only question should be whether or not west has four tricks to set 4♠! East cannot realistically provide any defensive tricks - if N/S buy the contract. Therefore a pre-emptive raise to 4♥ might be the best course of action.

THE BARRIER

The concept that many still seem to be struggling with, is that opener should not rebid higher than 2 of the opening suit - UNLESS opener has a very good opening hand of 17+.

Having opened 1♣, with 11- 16 pts., there is a barrier for the rebid of 2♣

When your second suit is *lower* ranking than your first suit, you need to jump a level of bidding to show the reverse.

REVERSE BIDS 1.

1. A 'Reverse bid' is a dreadful term that confuses most people.
2. A 'Reverse bid' is not always 100% forcing. It can sometimes be passed if partner has a bare minimum.
3. Opener's 'Reverse bid' describes a strong hand. (17+ after a 1 level response) or (15+ after a 2 level response and forcing to game.)
4. IF partner were to bid again after a 'reverse bid' they would usually have to do so at the 3 level.

On these three sequences, west's rebids are described as 'Reverse Bids'. Each of west's rebids is higher than 2♦.

BUT 2♣ also describes a hand where game is on with virtually no help from partner.

Normally responder cannot stop bidding until at least game is reached.

With fewer than 8 pts, responder gives a NEGATIVE response of 2♦ suggesting that slam is unlikely.

(Responder should count an ace and king as the equivalent of 8 - and respond positively).

(*Holding 0-2 HCPs responder can often give a 2nd negative of 2NT)

1. Responder can use Stayman and transfers if opener rebids in NTs
2. In a game forcing situation, bidding game is weaker than showing support at the 3 level.

JACOBY 2NT

1♠ - 4♠ is a 'fast arrival' method of bidding game with *no* slam aspirations. It is made on a good fit, and a 7 loser, but lacking in controls.

In the past, to avoid missing slams, when responder had a big hand and a fit for partner's major, they would use a *delayed game raise*.

Today there are better methods and one of the best is **Jacoby 2NT**

Jacoby 2NT shows a fit, and a balanced or semi balanced hands with 12+pts. (if responder holds a singleton or void, *Splinter bids* can be used. (More later)

RESPONDER'S Options with a Major Suit Fit

- 1♥/♠ - 2♥/♠ = limit bid (9 loser / 5-8 pts)

It is often difficult to bid slams if both partners are only slightly better than minimum for bidding game, A bid of 2NT *after partner has opened a major* can be played as Jacoby 2NT. It would show a hand strong enough to bid game in the major. The purpose of the bid is to provide space to look for a slam.

SPLINTER BIDS.

In trump contracts, singletons and voids are almost as good as aces and kings.

We have already seen how Jacoby 2NT can show a fit and game values early in the auction.

Usually, the 2NT response will not have a singleton or void. Splinter bids cater for this possibility

They show :

1. a fit with partner (*4+ card trump support*)
2. game values.
3. **a singleton or void in the suit bid.**

Splinter bids by Responder - after a MAJOR suit opening by partner.

Splinter bids are used to show singletons & voids by responding to opener with a double jump in the short suit.

Cue Bidding After a Splinter Raise

Any new suit bid is a slam try, showing first round control in the bid suit. (*a cue bid.*)

Partner may cooperate with a cuebid of his own, or return to the agreed trump suit to sign-off.

4NT by either partner is RKCB (The Splinter bid sets partner's suit as trumps).

Hand Evaluation after a Splinter Raise

Axx is an optimal holding opposite a Splinter raise: the partnership's honours are all located in the remaining three suits where they will complement each other, and slam is likely even without 33 HCPs.

Other honors (especially queens and jacks) in the splinter suit are mostly waste paper.

Do not Splinter with a singleton ace or king. Partner will expect values in *the other suits*.

3 TYPES OF CUE BIDS

On the basis that you would never bid a suit that the opponents have bid NATURALLY, bidding their suit is an excellent way of making sure that partner does not pass. But why would we do this?

East is sufficiently interested in slam to cue bid the ♦A. West can now decide that slam is unlikely without the ♠A.

East however carries on to show 2nd round control in spades. After west shows ♦K, east bids the slam

UNASSUMING CUE BID

Your partner, north, has made an overcall of 1♥
This shows anything from a poor 8 up to 15 HCPs.

You could bid 4♥ and find partner with only 8 pts. Down 2.

You could bid 3♥ and find partner with only 8 pts. Down 1.

You could bid pass and find partner with 13 pts. Missed game!

OR - with about an opening hand - and game interest -

You could bid LHO's suit (2♦) and find out how good partner's overcall was!

With a poor overcall, partner can sign off in 2♥

With a good overcall, partner can bid a high card feature. Not necessarily a suit - just an ace or king or QJ etc.

SLAM BIDDING

QUANTITATIVE RAISE TO 4NT

Remember that after a 1NT opening by partner, 4NT is NOT ace asking. It is quantitative asking partner to rebid 6NT with a maximum, or to pass with a minimum. After a 2NT opening 4NT requires the same decision.

'GERBER'

After a 1NT opening, some pairs agree to use 'Gerber' (4♣) asking for aces.

Responses are 4♦ = 0 aces, 4♥ = 1, 4♠ = 2, 4NT = 3. (We do not recommend using 'Gerber' at any other time.)

'BLACKWOOD'

Most pairs of course use 'Blackwood'. (4NT)

Responses are 5♣ = 0 or 4, 5♦ = 1, 5♥ = 2, 5♠ = 3. IF *and only if*, your side has all four aces, 5NT asks for kings.

'ROMAN KEY CARD BLACKWOOD'

Roman Key Card Blackwood is used alongside ordinary Blackwood - NOT instead of!

Use RKCB when a trump fit has been established.

Use ordinary Blackwood when no fit is found.

It was popularised in the 1980's by Eddie Kantar and it counts *key cards*, rather than simply aces.

The king of trumps becomes a fifth ace and it is sometimes referred to as "*Five Ace Blackwood*".

Responses to 4NT in RKC Blackwood are :

5♣	=	0 or 3	of five key cards.
5♦	=	1 or 4	of five key cards.
5♥	=	2	of five without the queen of trumps.
5♠	=	2	of five with the queen of trumps.

If partner subsequently bids 5NT asking for kings, use the normal Blackwood scale, but obviously exclude the king of trumps if you've already shown it.

Trump agreement is often obvious e.g. 1♠ - 3♠, but is sometimes shown by implication.

If partner jumps to 4NT from a suit, it is assumed that the last bid suit will be the trump suit.

If over 4NT partner responds 5♣ or 5♦, your bid of the next suit up (excluding the trump suit) would specifically ask partner whether they hold the *queen of trumps*.

S/he answers using (*stepped responses*.)

If partner **DID NOT** have the queen of trumps s/he would bid the cheapest suit.

If partner **DID** have the *queen of trumps, s/he would bid one suit higher than the cheapest suit. e.g.

*With the trump queen, some partnerships agree to show an outside king instead of stepped responses.

WEAK TWOS - IN THREE SUITS

Benji & Multi

Benjaminised Acol is the most popular system to use Weak Twos, but there are other systems that use them. One of these is the '**Multi Coloured Two Diamonds**' where an opening bid of 2♦ shows any one of a number of hands. The hand may be a weak two in the majors, or a strong two in the minors, or a strong balanced hand with a specific range. Thankfully this is now a rare animal in our area. Unless you have masochistic tendencies avoid using this bid.

Weak Twos in Three Suits

Another system which is much simpler, uses 'Weak Twos' in diamonds, as well as for the majors. The disadvantage is that your *only* strong opening bid now is 2♣, and you need to be convinced that an opening bid of 2♦ has sufficient pre-emptive value to compensate for this lack of clarity with big hands. Of course you still have the limit bid of 2NT to show a balanced 20-22 count, but you lose the distinction between the traditional Acol opening bid of 2♣ and the Acol 'Strong Twos' (2♦, 2♥, and 2♠)

In 'old' Acol, 2♣ was forcing to game but the 'Acol Strong Two' openings were not. Therefore if you decide to play this system you need to have an agreement as to whether 2♣ is, 100% forcing to game. You may decide for instance that after a 2♦ negative response to 2♣, 2♥ and 2♠ are strong but not forcing.

2♣ opening shows either 23+ balanced, or a 4 loser with at least 7 controls

('Controls' are aces and kings, where an ace = 2, king = 1).

So, the hand should have at least three aces and a king, or two aces and three kings.

Standard Weak Twos:

Defined as 6-10 points and a six card suit of reasonable quality. Agree the range with partner.
'Weak Twos' must be ANNOUNCED as "Weak"

Responses 2NT shows game interest. (**Ogust responses** are popular but need to be learned/agreed).
3 of opener's suit is pre-emptive not invitational.
Decide with partner whether a change of suit is forcing!

The 2♣ Opening:

Defined as EITHER "Strong" and forcing (At least 7 controls and no worse than a 4 loser) or 23+ HCPs
2♣ opening bids **must be alerted**. (Not announced)

Responses 2♦ = Relay. (only broken if responder has a long suit headed by at least 2 of the top 3 honours.)

WEAK TWO OPENING BIDS

Weak Two bids

Essentially Weak Twos are an extension of the traditional pre-emptive bids which were based on a seven card suit, and opened at the three level. 3 level pre-empts are very difficult to counter, but fortunately for defenders, they do not crop up frequently.

Weak hands with SIX card suits are much more common.

Weak Twos are NON-FORCING! They are pre-emptive limit bids!!

Previously these hands were passed and you had to wait for a chance to overcall.

This meant that their pre-emptive value was lost.

There are four main types of weak 2 level opens.

1. A three way Multi Two Diamond bid. (only for Masochists and thankfully rare in this area.)
2. Weak Twos in diamonds, hearts & spades.
3. Weak Twos in the majors. The most popular variation is Benjaminised Acol or Benji for short.
4. Lucas Twos are gaining in popularity They show 5 of a the major AND a four card side suit.

When to open a Weak Two (showing a 6 card suit)

If you decide to make a weak two bid, the hand should ideally fulfill all of the following criteria:-

- 1.) The hand has a decent six card suit.
- 2.) The hand (if your suit is a major) should not have four cards in the other major.
- 3.) The hand has between 6 and 10 HCPs
- 4.) The hand will be read by partner, as an 8 loser.
- 5.) The hand DOES NOT have the criteria for a one level opening.

If your *Weak Two* is doubled, partner should pass even with a void in your suit, - **unless**, they **also** hold a six or seven card suit and a void in your suit. (**Opener should then pass partner's bid!**)

Otherwise never rescue! e.g. 2♥ X 3♣ = 6 or 7 clubs - non-forcing
 2♥ pass 3♣* = forcing for one round

*Occasionally, responder will have a big hand and may want to bid or investigate a game contract.

To develop the auction you could agree that any responding bid by partner is forcing for one round.

If you are at the **top** of the 6-10 range, you could then bid any high card feature outside your six card trump suit.

An immediate raise to game by responder should have around 15+ HCPs

Many club players use the more precise '**Ogust**' responses

but they are difficult to remember and not recommended unless you are playing a lot of competitive bridge.

OGUST RESPONSES TO WEAK TWOS

When partner has opened a 'weak two' in hearts or spades, responder should read it as an 8 loser.
Options as responder are as follows :-

- With fewer than three of partner's suit and fewer than 16 H.C.P.s - generally pass.
- With three cards in opener's suit you can continue the pre-empt according to the L.T.C.
- **2NT** is '**OGUST**' showing game interest.
It is asking partner for a clearer definition of the strength of the hand AND the suit.

A strong HAND is defined as being 9/10 H.C.P.s.

A strong SUIT is defined as having *two of the top three honours*. i.e. AK or AQ or KQ.

After an opening bid of 2♥ or 2♠ by partner - **2NT** is **FORCING** and asks for more definition.
Opener will rebid as follows:



3♣ = WEAK HCPs. and WEAK suit
3♦ = WEAK HCPs and STRONG suit

Rebid a minor to show weak points
MINOR = **MINIMUM** HCPs (5-8 pts.)



3♥ = STRONG HCPs and WEAK suit
3♠ = STRONG HCPs and STRONG suit

Rebid a major to show strong points

Otherwise, assuming 4+ pts., responder will use **3♣ Puppet Stayman**. The 3♣ enquiry, asks whether opener has a **four**, or a **five** card major. **NOTE - The two exceptions given below,***

2NT - 3♣

Opener makes one of the following rebids

3♥ =	five hearts	Responder can now bid 3NT or 4♥ with three hearts
3♠ =	five spades	Responder can now bid 3NT or 4♠ with three spades
3NT =	no four or five card major	Pass
3♦ =	at least one four card major	Responder, holding four hearts, bids 3♠ Responder, holding four spades, bids 3♥ This ensures that the strong hand plays the contract!

NOTE - 2NT - *3NT shows both majors. (4 hearts AND 4 spades.)

2NT - *3♠ shows 4 hearts AND 5 spades. (You cannot use transfers can you?)
